These databases are designed to help students add information from magazines, journals, encyclopedia and professional documents to their projects.

To locate them go to www.learn71.ca then Library Commons and then Research Databases.

You do not need a password for these when you are working at school but when you are at home you will. To find your school password log in to Destiny and you will see a link to the passwords on the bottom right.
