


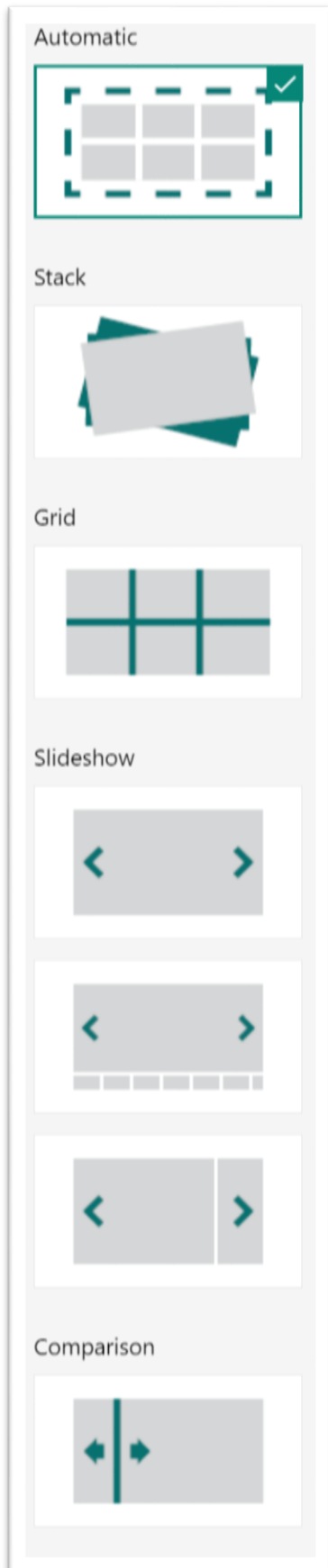


Grouping Your Cards

You can group your cards to make slideshows, stacks, comparisons and grids to show your cards in more interesting ways.

Types of Groupings:



Automatic will choose how your pictures will be grouped.

Stack



The pictures will be stacked on top of each other. The viewer needs to click on the pictures to flip through them.

Grid



Images will be placed in a grid.

Slideshow



Viewer can click on the arrows to move through the slideshow of your images. There are three different ways to arrange the slideshow:

Simple slideshow



Slideshow with thumbnail images of other slides at the bottom.



Slideshow with a piece of the next slide showing.

Comparison



Viewer can slide a marker from one side to the other to reveal the other picture.
